THE 2001 SEASON

A season beginning with aspirations of Premier Division cricket in 2002 came to grips with reality before many weeks were past. Peter Jouning's 1st team managership deflected some of the administrative pressures from skipper Bill Dean and when Mike Brown and Matt Creese emerged from Durham University a base of points was gradually rebuilt to pave a path for a mid-table place in the middle division. "Average" may seem a harsh summing up of the season but it was not a million miles from the truth.

The second disappointment was the demise of the 3rd XI not only from the position of being champions the previous season but suffering, by the minutest of margins, the ordeal of relegation. This only leaves the 2nd XI in their equivalent of the premier division, but in their own case it seemed more than a miracle to have achieved that survival.

The 1st XI again finished strongly to attain 5th place out of ten, the same as in 2000. The loss of our best bowler, Colin Saville, before a league match was played, might be interpreted by some as careless. The subsequent departure of our best batsman, Stuart Tohill, within a fortnight was little short of disastrous. Both left for eminently acceptable and understandable domestic reasons, and we wish them both every happiness and success at their new homes in Lincolnshire and Scotland respectively. In the meantime we had to pick up the pieces and it was to the considerable credit of the 1st XI team and management that such a rewarding position was achieved by the end of the season. Amongst the batsmen, Jamie Jouning was pre-eminent, with a succession of good scores in both the league and cup matches, and Michael Brown's timely arrival from Durham at the end of June provided a touch of class to a reinvigorated side, not least due to the acquisition of Mike Stafford from Uxbridge. Jeremy Dangerfield showed his maturity with the bat and, along with South African Gareth Berg, provided valuable backbone to the batting. Jamie Thorpe came into his own. At 17, and only being permitted to bowl six overs in a spell, he consistently produced miserly returns in those spells and showed a lot of pace. With Bill Dean taking on the mantle of leading off-spinner, he and paceman Berg shared over 50 league wickets between them.

The 2nd XI again once again contrived to avoid relegation (this is becoming somewhat repetitive), but Adrian Carr's side seemed to produce the spirit at the right time, even if they couldn't usually produce the runs to match good bowling performances. The captain led by example with over 350 runs and 31 wickets. Dave Woffinden batted consistently well and Peter Bownes often showed his natural ability with the bat. Sage was supported with the ball by the evergreen Geoff Blackmore (23 wickets), James Hobbs and Australian Justin Perks who strongly vied with Berg as the 1st XI's overseas player.

The 3rd XI, whose season was touched on earlier, suffered from the knock-on effect of poor availability at the top of the club and consequently found it difficult to compete. The particular absence of Crawford and Wilkins, who had driven wedges into the opposition's early batting so often the previous year, was the most noticeable. Nevertheless, to lose by what was a league regulation technicality was irksome in the least – finishing on equal points with Hampstead who survived the drop but who had lost three more matches than us.

The 4th XI suffered similarly from fielding sides of inconsistent strength, and only the exceptional run accumulation of Lennie Stokes, supported by the consistency of Mel Dowsett and captain Doug Gordon, made us a competitive opposition. Andrew Hawthorn continued to be the side's most accurate bowler.

At the top end of the Club the chief run scorers were Jamie Jouning (764), Gareth Berg (743), Micky Stafford (595) and Michael Brown (518 in ten completed innings). Adrian Carr scored 625 at 1st and 2nd XI level, and 17 year-old Matt Feeney 595. Len Stokes took advantage of (mostly) 4th XI attacks to plunder 761 runs, and newcomer part way into the season Dan Ashley proved himself a popular and useful acquisition, scoring 454 runs at 30 an innings and sealed his arrival by winning the tongue-in-cheek Piano Award at the End of Season Supper.


Gareth Berg was the most successful bowler with 55 wickets, whose pace was at times exceedingly quick for opposition batsmen and those of us not used to keeping wicket at elevated levels. 17 year-old Jamie Thorpe was immensely successful, and worked with cheerful vitality for his 49 wickets, and batsmen were often let off the hook after enduring a fiercely enthusiastic opening spell because of Jamie's age-related bowling limitation. Adrian Carr again underlined his value as a genuine all-rounder by coupling his run aggregate with 47 wickets, and Geoff Blackmore took 39 at whatever level the Club felt he was needed most at any given weekend. The most promising new prospect, however, was 14 year-old leg-spinner Michael Stevens who took 29 wickets at 17 apiece, including 5-45 against Cockfosters 1st XI.

2002 will be marked by the optimism of the 1st and 3rd XIs actively striving to regain their places in the 1st divisions of the Middlesex County League. As far as the 3rd and 4th teams are concerned, it is to be the club's policy to encourage the senior colts at all times by playing them in league matches and, on Sundays, the friendly club fixtures. This will not only help them to bridge the gap between schoolboy and adult cricket, but also to cement their relationship with Southgate and encourage them to remain as playing members for many years to come. There is an immense amount of talent in the 13-16 year-old range here at Southgate and, unlike other prominent clubs in this area, we are keen to give those boys a chance to compete at a good level in an environment where they will feel welcome and at home and, more than anything, enjoy playing cricket.



1st XI

The 2001 season began with such optimism. A greatly strengthened squad meant that for the first time in many years there would be real quality in depth, with promotion to the Premier League a very realistic possibility. For the first time the club had created the role of Cricket Manager and Peter Jouning was in place as Southgate's answer to Duncan Fletcher. The pre-season nets had been impressively attended with visits from at least three players with first class experience. Unfortunately this was when reality set in.

We knew that Matt Creese and Michael Brown would be at Durham for the first part of the season, but we hadn't counted on losing three of our best performers from the previous year. To lose Colin Saville after 15 years was as unexpected as it was sad, but to lose vice-captain Stuart Tohill after four games and Saqib Mahmood after only one, was catastrophic. To compound matters, not one of the promised new stars materialised, and once again we were looking at the usual suspects - Jeremy, Jamie, Ben, Steve Rowe and myself as the sole survivors from last year's side. Realistically we would be doing well to be in the frame come the second half of the season; however we did have the arrival of South African overseas player Gareth Berg to look forward to.

After a few pre-season friendlies it was clear that in Gareth and a greatly improved Jamie Thorpe we had a seam bowling attack of real promise. And so it proved in our first league outing at Hornsey. The game started at 1.00, and at 5.00 we were in the bar, with 10 points under our belt. We had bowled Hornsey out for 58 runs, which we managed to knock off in 11 overs. Perhaps things would be all right after all?

Unfortunately the next couple of games didn't go our way, even though we had good chances to win both. Inserted on a damp wicket against Hampstead's pace attack, we managed to compile a respectable 114. With the opposition at 55 - 4 we missed a couple of good chances and could easily have gone on to win, but how we managed to lose against Shepherds Bush we will never know. Chasing 196, we found ourselves 145-2 with 8 overs still to go, only to suffer a ridiculous collapse, culminating in us having to bat out the last over with two wickets in hand. Southgate 178 all out. Who knows what would have happened had we had 30 points after three games?

A win against North Mid lifted the gloom, courtesy of a fine knock of 82 by acting captain Jeremy, and four wickets from Gareth. But this was followed by three straight defeats, two in the league, at the hands of very mediocre Barnes and Barnet sides, and one in the first round of the National, away to Beaconsfield. In all three games the quality of the teams we were putting out was particularly disappointing. It was at this stage that at last we turned the corner. Michael Brown and Matthew Creese had returned from Durham, and I had received a surprise 'phone call from Michael Stafford expressing his wish to become a Southgate man.

So we headed off to Stanmore with a greatly strengthened side and real optimism. A beautifully compiled century from Michael laid the foundations for a convincing 4-point draw, a feat he repeated the next week, with 102 against Ickenham in another winning draw. Three tons on the trot was a real

possibility, but it was not to be, Brownny missing out with a mere 66 in the return against Hornsey. For the third week running we picked up four points but our inability to bowl a side out had cost us dear.

With our confidence regained, the second half of the season should really have seen us push hard for a promotion place - inconsistency again proved our downfall. We fought hard against a strong Hampstead side but despite some gutsy batting against a high class bowling attack we failed to post a big enough total. The gulf in class (the Hampstead XI included eight players with first class experience) became alarmingly evident as their openers knocked the runs off with consummate ease. A crunch game at Shepherds Bush followed. A win and a promotional place would have been a real possibility - a defeat and we'd be staring down the barrel at mid-table mediocrity.

Prompted by the enthusiastic contributions in the field of Des, Greeners and Adam, who'd been drafted into to lend a hand, the first hour couldn't have gone better. Wickets tumbled, catches were held - we had Shepherds Bush on the ropes. Unfortunately the proverbial killer instinct that is such a vital component in any successful side simply did not feature in our armoury and we allowed the Bush to recover and post an adequate 200. Our batting then let us down again and despite a solid knock from Dan Ashley (37), who showed us his undoubted 1st XI potential, we collapsed miserably. Mid-season mediocrity it was, then!

Quite typically we then put together back-to-back wins against North Middlesex and Barnes. The highlight of these had to be Ben Hartman's refusal to take a single to long-off in the run chase against Barnes because he wanted to hit the winning run for four - which he promptly did the very next ball. We batted well against Harrow, the top four scoring runs freely and in good time. The game was, however, very much in the balance with Harrow's skipper David Walker looking in increasingly dangerous form until the heavens opened and the game had to be abandoned. No bad thing in the end because it allowed the first team to set up the Clubhouse for what proved to be a highly successful 1st XI cocktail evening, well supported throughout the club. My thanks again to Denise and Caroline for preparing such a magnificent spread.

An explosive game at Barnet proved beyond doubt why we really must gain promotion to the Premier division - if the thought of never having to play at Barnet again isn't incentive enough, then God only knows what is! A way below par bowling display (Barnet were 60 for 0 inside 8 overs) was followed by an equally abject batting performance, punctuated briefly by some lusty hitting from Tartars and some stoical rearguard defence from Adam. One point from two games against Barnet really isn't good enough.

Another highly contentious game, this time against Ickenham, rounded off the season. That Rowley managed to survive intact after an unfortunate disagreement with Ickenham's resident psychopath was remarkable in itself. The fact that we won the game via a diving Jamie Jouning slip catch off Thorpey, when Ickenham needed only 4 to win was verging on the miraculous. The final dénouement was made even sweeter when we realised that our victory and Barnes' last gasp win in their final game of the season, sent Ickenham down. Poor old Monkey!!

Several players deserve special mention for their performances over the season. Jamie Jouning batted consistently well throughout, and showed great maturity batting at number three. He thoroughly deserved to win The Hawker Trophy. Jeremy compiled several quality innings and took vital wickets which contributed to at least three of our wins, whilst Michael Brown with 429 league runs at an average of 53 showed that he is head and shoulders above anybody else with the bat. Jamie Thorpe's season went from strength to strength as he added consistency to his pace and showed clear signs that he could one day perform at a higher level. Gareth performed well on occasions but in truth never really fulfilled his undoubted potential.

Peter Jouning's contribution was very important and largely went unnoticed. He is passionate about Southgate Cricket Club, and the support he gave to myself and the first team squad was both valuable and greatly appreciated.

So to next season. We have some excellent cricketers at the club but we certainly need a little more depth to be challenging next season. Justin Perks as our overseas player will make a difference and I'm sure Mike Stafford's second year at the club will be prolific. We have an excellent captain-elect in Jamie Jouning. All we need is a couple of players, and a little bit of luck!

2nd XI League

In 2000 I stated that we had avoided relegation by the "skin of our teeth". Seeing, however, that the margin had been 15 points, I am at a loss to describe what in 2001 was the footballing equivalent of goal difference - same number of points as Stanmore but more wickets taken throughout the season.

Fortunately, therefore, we will once again be playing against the likes of Brondesbury, Ealing, Finchley, Richmond, Teddington and Winchmore Hill instead of Barnet, Barnes, Brentham, Barclays Bank and the Bush.

In fact eight of the ten teams in our league have their 1st XIs playing in Division One and, therefore, avoiding relegation whatever the margin must in itself be seen as an achievement. Also I would point out that our division was just about the tightest of all nine divisions within the Middlesex League. Winchmore Hill were champions with 85 points, South Hampstead were bottom with 46 points. Compare this, for example, to the 2nd Division (107/24) and 3rd Division (90/27). The 1st XI divisions were even more marked with 102/20, 115/13 and 100/13 respectively.

Nevertheless 2001 was still a disappointing season. Midway through the season we travelled to Ealing on the back of a string of good results feeling that victory would make us contenders for the league. On a good wicket, with Ealing 161 all out, we were 51 for 1 off 15 overs but the heavens opened and the game was abandoned one point each. For the rest of the season we were in freefall collecting just three points from the final five games.

To coin a footballing cliché, 2001 proved to be a "game of two halves". Whereas our bowling was arguably the strongest in the league, our batting must have been the weakest. The average score against us was 175 but we could muster only 153 in return. In the final two games, to be certain of avoiding relegation we had to make just 140 against Stanmore and 150 against Hampstead but fell miserably short on both occasions.

In 2000 I had suggested that Peter Bownes, James Hobbs, Russell Foster and RBL had batted to something approaching the best of their abilities but they will all be disappointed to have averaged considerably less in 2001. David Woffinden, Martyn Kennedy and James Mosley did bat consistently although the latter's jet-set lifestyle is still affecting availability, and Charlie McEachern showed glimpses of his natural immense talent but must learn that dedication and responsibility are just as important. Critical contributions with the bat that led directly to points being secured were also made by Mike Greenup, Shaun Flook and Geoff Blackmore.

With six good bowlers regularly available, we invariably had control in the field and were seldom set 200. The arrival of Justin Perks was a real bonus and for whichever team he represents he will be an asset and in my opinion with bat as well as ball. Siva and Shaun Flook were reliable as ever, Geoff

Blackmore, between making his 1st XI début and captaining the 3rd XI, still managed 23 wickets at 16.5, and James Hobbs after his "annus horribilis" in 2000 returned to form with 20 at 18. Significantly, after taking 7 wickets at 38 off a long run, I took 24 at 15.33 bowling "all-sorts" off two paces. Matthew Feeney looked a good prospect and for a leg-spinner showed remarkable control.

I thought our fielding was excellent, Charlie McEachern in particular, and much improved on last year, and this was rewarded with a high number of run-outs.



3rd XI League

40 players (and the term was often loosely used) represented the 3rd XI in 2001. This instability is invariably the symptom of a side undergoing considerable uncertainty, except that it was not of our own doing. Skipper David Howell performed wonders in conjuring up new players who represented the club in subsequent weeks with distinction, but nothing could alter the fact that availability for the first part of the season was, well, abysmal, and the two bottom sides had to make do with what they were given. The result was that the 3rd XI, needing to win the last game to survive relegation, were held to a draw in the tightest of circumstances and were forced to accept the inevitable.

The difference between the championship-winning side of 2000 and the relegated side of 2001 was plain and simple to see. Bowling. That is, lack of it. The batting was as brittle as it had been the previous year but had been bailed out time and again by excellent bowling spells or dramatic tail-end recoveries which, in another context, would have defied all reason. Last season it was not to be.

It was also pretty clear that the gap between the 3rd XI and 4th XI (or at least their oppositions, shall we say) was marked to say the least. Only Matt Goodley and Des Beatty (when he was allowed to play at our level) showed any degree of reliability with the bat and the few free-scorers in the 4th team who were invited to move up a level found the going difficult.

Indications became fairly clear during the very first match at home to Brondesbury. We had struggled to 120 with some excellent and unexpected rearguard action from Doc Howell and 14 year-old Michael Stevens. At 43-6 Bron themselves were teetering on the brink but our two bowlers, Chris Marshall and League debutant Mike Limm, who had bowled out of their skins, grew tired, and batsmen 7 and 8 just let things quietly progress to an efficient victory and disappointing defeat for us. Predictions that we might not only fail to defend the championship but also avoid relegation were not wide of the mark, even at this formative stage of the season.

A brief ray of inspiration came at Wembley where a perhaps predictable 38-5 matured into 204 and Geoff Blackmore's five wickets almost brought us a valuable victory – but they held on with nine down. Heavy defeats followed against Richmond, Hampstead and Teddington before salvaging a point against Ealing who seemed more concerned with giving the opener his hundred (out of 250) than achieving an otherwise inevitable ten points. Further drubbings by Winchmore Hill and Brondesbury (240 in 40 overs, notwithstanding 6-56 by James Barber including a hat-trick!) must have made us look like the ultimate pushovers of the division but we bounced back with a seven-wicket win at home to Hornsey (James Barber 5-28).

Wembley's team seemed to be a division above us as we collapsed at home to 105 and their recent acquisition from Sudbury Court (who nine days earlier had hammered a hundred a against a Southgate XI for the 1987 League and who went on to make good scores in Wembley's 1st XI) took them to a ten-wicket victory. An abandoned game at Richmond was followed by a stupendous win by five wickets over Hampstead due to Mohamed's 5-38 and powerful batting down the top order (for a change). The Finchley match was abandoned after we got 201, but the most remarkable of our three wins came at home against Teddington when, chasing 259 for 4, we won in the available 47 overs thanks to Steve Banyard's superb unbeaten 121.

The final match was against Winchmore Hill and we needed to win to ensure survival in the 1st Division if Hampstead were to win their match. We had a good side for the occasion but lost a critical toss and were forced to bat first. We made 207 for 9 and, after Sivarajah took six wickets, had five futile overs at the last Winchmore Hill pair. Just the four points. Hampstead duly won their game and ended on equal points with us. They had one more four-point draw than us, so we joined Hornsey in Division 2 for 2002.

The only consoling factor is that in a lower division we may have more games where we can compete on equal terms, but the need to get back up to Division One will be paramount in our minds.

4th XI – 1987 League

The 4th XI had a mixed season. The start was difficult because heavy rain meant we didn't play until 26th May and then it was always a struggle to build up momentum. Difficulties across the club with availability of players had the inevitable effect on the 4th XI and teams included a large number of new players and colts. In these circumstances we did well to hold our own, the highlight being a game at Wembley where they batted first and scored as many as they liked, including 133 n.o. from an Aussie import. It turned out the Aussie was really a bowler who terrorised several MCCL teams later in the year, but some stern resistance, particularly from Phil Stevens and Michael Stavri meant we earned a draw.

From the end of June we started to play some of the weaker teams in the division. A home game against Kenton featured a few 'home only' selections and led to Charlie McEachern's maiden hundred and what should have been the first win of the season. This had to wait until the following week against an inexperienced North London team on a difficult wicket. Fauzan Ismail and Andrew Hawthorn, in what turned out to be the start of a rich vein of form, knocked them over cheaply and Len Stokes anchored the batting for a comfortable win.

This was the start of a remarkable sequence of innings for Len which resulted in four hundreds and nearly 700 league runs. Naturally this coincided with a big improvement in results. We just failed in a close run chase against well-placed Alexandra Park and won away at Hanwell, where excellent slow bowling by Stokes and Michael Stevens resulted in manageable total, which was achieved largely through a good opening stand of 85 between Stokes and Doug Gordon.

There was a mid-season dip in results around holidays in August, but at this time there was also the game that was probably the highlight of the season. Ian Henley led the team in a fine victory against Edmonton IV. A total of 226 was built around an eighty from Mel Dowsett and then a good team bowling performance, where five people took wickets, secured a victory.

A tight draw with Kenton was set up by Stokes' batting, but achieved largely by Andrew Hawthorn's bowling. He took three wickets at important times and went for less than three an over when all other bowlers went for more than five. After an easy win against North London V, which featured a well deserved five wicket haul from Marlon McCaskill, we came to the last game of the season at Edmonton III's. We were keen to show what we could do against a promoted team and this resulted in an excellent batting performance. A second wicket stand of 165 between Graham Delf (119) and Kunjal Haria (91 n.o.) was full of aggressive stroke play and meant we could declare on 282-3. In reply Edmonton batted positively, wickets fell steadily but not quickly enough, and with good batting all down the team they got the target for eight down when it looked like our spinners, Wilmshurst and Moran might just do it.

We finished in a respectable mid-table position, but after the slow start never threatened for promotion, and had to take satisfaction from a few good performances rather than a consistent campaign. We used a lot of players (total 34), including useful new members, such as Mike Limm and Simon Veysi, though there was a consistent backbone (Gordon, Henley, Stavri, Stevens, Wilmshurst, Hawthorn,

Stokes and latterly Rolt and Haria). If we can get the team together early enough next year I think we'll do well.
